39. DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST

None

40. MINUTES - 24th APRIL 2018

The minutes of the meeting held on 24th April 2018 were confirmed as a correct record and signed by the Chairman.

41. MONITORING OFFICER

The Chairman asked the Deputy Monitoring Officer, Fiona McMillan, to leave the meeting for the duration of this item.

The Committee received a report on the proposed changes to the Constitution following the proposal to appoint a shared post of Director of Governance and Legal Services for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. In presenting the report, the Chief Executive noted that it would be beneficial to have a monitoring officer at the heart of management in Cambridgeshire County Council, which was why she was recommending the role and subsequent amendments.

It was also noted that the Constitution and Ethics Committee's responsibility was to consider the necessary amendments to the Constitution and recommend the changes to Full Council, although any amendments would not be made until recruitment for the new position was complete. It was also recognised that Councillor Reynolds' position on the Staffing and Appeals Committee involved in the recruitment did not represent a conflict of interest.

In discussing the proposed changes Members:

Expressed their support for the role and queried whether the position would be for a single in-house lawyer working across both councils. It was noted that the position would operate in this way with the Monitoring Officer commissioning legal work from LGSS Law Limited. It was likely that a deputy would also be appointed further down the line according to the requirements of the post holder. Queried how the position would differ from the current arrangement. Members were informed that the Monitoring Officer was previously employed by LGSS Law Limited. It was noted that the proposed arrangement involved an officer employed by the Council to provide dedicated advice and support but working across two authorities.

 Were informed that the arrangements for appointing a deputy at Cambridgeshire and Peterborough and would be decided by the appointee and considered during the interview process.

Having considered the amendments to the Constitution, it was resolved unanimously to:

Recommend the changes as set out in the report to Full Council.

42. GUIDANCE FOR MEMBERS AND OFFICERS ON OUTSIDE BODIES

The Committee received a report on guidance to the law for Members and officers who were appointed to represent the Council on outside bodies, which had been drafted as part of the Council's consideration of actions flowing from an investigation into complaints involving community transport organisations FACT, HACT and ESACT. In presenting the report, the Acting Monitoring Officer informed Members that currently there were no guidelines on these issues for Members or officers and that some were perhaps unaware of responsibilities and potential conflicts of interest. It was noted that the guidance was presented in draft format and that the Committee was being asked to propose amendments and decide whether to issue the guidance or refer it to Full Council for approval.

In discussing the report, Members:

- Noted that they had found themselves in situations where they were judged to have held an interest without their knowledge and that while there were brief mentions of these issues in the Localism Act and the Council's Code of Conduct, these mentions were insufficient and had left Members and officers uninformed of their obligations. It was agreed that potential liability arising from such confusions would be reduced through the formalised guidance under consideration.
- Proposed that before taking the guidance to Full Council a full review should be carried out, as quickly as possible, of all the outside bodies that had a relationship with the Council to establish their relevance and current status, noting that some bodies might not require a representative of the Council. After the review, the outside bodies nomination list would be redrawn and all relevant Members and officers briefed and informed of their legal status e.g. observer, director or trustee.
- Considered the role of the Strategic Management Team (SMT) in the review process, noting that most appointments to outside bodies were made by the relevant Policy and Service Committee. It was suggested that each Service should assign an officer to review the outside bodies relating to their area and following consultation the Policy and Service Committee Chairs, Vice-Chairs and Lead Members determine the necessity for a Member to be appointed to them.
- Noted that individual Members would be informed of the review early in the
 process to avoid conflict if positions on outside bodies were removed without
 prior knowledge and also to ensure that they were alerted to guidance as soon
 as possible.

- Observed that the procedure with officers would be different and that the SMT would need to include officers in the review as well as the Members.
- Proposed categorising the involvement of Members and officers on outside bodies according to the level of the position held, as well as differentiating between appointed and nominated positions. Current position holders would be advised and given the opportunity to acknowledge any potential conflicts or step down.
- Considered that taking the guidance to Full Council would allow all Members the opportunity to become aware of its existence while emphasising its importance to them.
- Expressed concern that the guidance be issued in a timely manner. It was noted that the review process would be completed by the following Constitution and Ethics Committee meeting (29th November 2018) and at that point it would be decided whether to issue the guidance or refer to Full Council.
- Noted that the guidance was unclear on who the Members and officers were responsible to with respect to the Council and LGSS. The presenting officer suggested that including a list of scenarios would help and that each situation was different, which was why the review of each individual body was so important.
- Suggested that training could be conducted following the review, which would include informing Members on their responsibilities and liabilities depending on their specific level of involvement.

It was resolved unanimously to:

- a) Consider and note the draft guidance for Members and officers
- b) To instruct officers to carry out a fundamental review of appointments to all outside bodies and the way they were categorised, to sit alongside the guidance. The result of the review to be brought back to Constitution and Ethics Committee.

43. COUNCIL - PUBLIC QUESTION TIME

The Committee received a report proposing changes to rules relating to public questions to Council and Committees/Sub-Committees, including repeat questions, exceeding the number of questions allowed and the scope of questions. It was noted that the changes were essentially tidying up wording and bringing the Council's constitution in line with those of other councils and that any changes would be recommended to the Full Council.

In response to Members' questions, the officer:

- Confirmed that the Monitoring Officer would be responsible for making any decision regarding the rejection of questions.
- Clarified that questions were currently limited to four, with any further questioners invited to defer to a later meeting, although the Chairman had the

discretion to accept more questions if deemed appropriate. It was also noted that while this provision already existed in the Constitution for questions asked during committee meetings, it was not included for Full Council.

- Acknowledged that the Chairman of the Council could currently suspend standing orders to allow further questions and had the discretion to allow further questions but emphasised that this was not included in the constitution and that the amendments would clarify the situation. It was noted that the Chairman's discretion was rarely needed and would not set a precedent. It was also confirmed that the Chairman would be under no obligation to extend the limit.
- Assured Members that the proposer of any questions exceeding the set limit for Council and not deferred to the next meeting would receive a written replay following consultation with Group Leaders, ensuring transparency,
- Noted that excess questions regarding items that appeared on the meeting agenda would be more likely to be accepted than questions unrelated to topics discussed at the meeting, while questioners seeking to ask various questions on a similar or identical topic would be encouraged to put one question forward to allow space for others.
- Confirmed that the public's rights were not being limited as the amendments would improve communication and ensure their rights. The only limit being added was regarding the six month rule, which was already enforced for committee meetings.
- Acknowledged that the wording in the Constitution for the scope of permitted questions was broad and as a result questions had never been turned down.

Having considered the amendments to the constitution, it was agreed unanimously to:

Recommend the changes set out in Appendices 1 and 2 of the report to Full Council.

44. TRANSFER OF DELEGATED RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE COUNCIL'S WHISTLEBLOWING POLICY

The Committee received a report recommending the transfer of its delegated responsibility for the Council's whistleblowing policy to the Audit and Accounts Committee in order to address the current overlap regarding responsibility for whistleblowing reports and oversights of the whistleblowing policy. The Acting Monitoring Officer reported as the Internal Auditor was responsible for the policy it was appropriate that reports should be made to the Audit and Accounts Committee.

In response to questions, Members:

- Noted that complaints against Councillors would continue to be dealt with by the Constitution and Ethics Committee.
- Noted that whistleblowing issues had initially been assigned to the Constitution and Ethics Committee following the abolition of Standards Committees. One Member queried whether Audit and Accounts Committee would consider

inherent ethical issues and expressed concern that these issues might not be treated adequately. The Acting Monitoring Officer reported that she attended Audit and Accounts Committee meetings in both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough when necessary.

• Noted that only two whistleblowing cases had occurred over the past year.

It was resolved unanimously to:

Recommend to Full Council that the constitution be amended to pass the delegated responsibility for the Council's whistleblowing policy and oversight from the Constitution and Ethics Committee to the Council's Audit and Accounts Committee.

45. A REVIEW OF THE COMPLAINTS RECEIVED UNDER THE MEMBERS' CODE OF CONDUCT TO 18 SEPTEMBER 2018

The Committee received a report on the number and nature of complaints received about Members between 13th April and 18th September 2018. Of the three complaints received during this period, one investigation had been completed and was included in the report for noting, while the remaining two would be presented to the Committee once the investigations were completed.

In discussing the report, Members:

 Considered the fact that committees often presented public reports on complaints only when the investigation determined that a breach of regulations had occurred. It was noted that evidence of an investigation, regardless of the outcome, was beneficial and increased transparency.

It was resolved unanimously to:

Note the report.

46. AGENDA PLAN

The Committee considered its agenda plan, noting that an additional item had been identified for its next meeting, namely the report on the review of outside bodies.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Cambridgeshire Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) is scheduled to meet on 22nd November 2018 to agree the preferred model from options presented, for establishing a formal joint working relationship between the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Boards. A copy of the report is attached at **Appendix 1**.
- 1.2 The meeting of the Cambridgeshire HWB will take place after the publication of the agenda for Constitution and Ethics Committee. An officer from Public Health will therefore be attending the meeting to inform the Committee of the outcome of the Cambridgeshire HWB meeting.

2. OPTIONS FOR JOINT WORKING

2.1 The Cambridgeshire HWB is being asked to consider two options around how joint working between the two HWBs could work.

2.2 Option 1 – Parent Board with joint sub-committee

Both Cambridgeshire & Peterborough HWBs maintain their "Parent Board" but hold meetings of the "Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Board (a subcommittee comprising of both boards)" where items that are relevant to both committees will be discussed e.g. wider system integration issues. Legally the status of these joint meetings means they are referred to as a sub-committee however they will be able to discharge agreed functions of both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs and will have delegated decision making authority. Membership would comprise of the full membership of both the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs.

- 2.3 Option 1 will require a change to the Council's Constitution in order to delegate powers and functions currently within the remit of the Cambridgeshire HWB to a "Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Board (a sub-committee comprising of both boards)". The proposed changes to the Council's Constitution are set out in **Appendix 2**.
- 2.4 Option 2 Maintain the two separate Boards which periodically meet at the same time and with the same agenda Meeting in public together

 Maintain the independence of the two HWBs as two separate boards periodically holding a meeting at the same time and venue, with a shared agenda. This approach has been tested at the meetings held on 31st May and 20th September. The meeting would need to be jointly chaired and any recommendations or decisions recorded separately for each Board. Operationally this is quite a cumbersome approach as it requires duplication of officer time with the production of two sets of minutes and having two chairs.
- 2.5 Option 2 does not require any changes to the Council's Constitution.

3. OTHER CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES

3.1 The Cambridgeshire HWB will be giving consideration to its existing membership if it agrees to establish a "Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Board (a subcommittee comprising of both Boards)". Currently the voluntary sector has a co-opted membership of the HWB, which may be formalised to a permanent membership.

1. PURPOSE

- 1.1 Health and Wellbeing Boards (HWB) bring into one forum representatives from health, social care and the local community to decide what the main public health needs of the local population are and to determine how best to meet these needs in an integrated and holistic manner. They have a statutory duty to encourage the integrated delivery of health and social care to advance the health and wellbeing of people in their area and reduce inequalities. A significant number of HWBs are now beginning to play a genuine leadership role across local health and care systems.
- 1.2 The purpose of this report is to provide options for Cambridgeshire Health and Wellbeing Board members to consider and agree in regards to formalising the joint working arrangements of both boards.

2 BACKGROUND

- 2.1 This discussion originates from a joint development session facilitated by the Local Government Association (LGA) for both HWBs on 23rd January 2018. Key areas of commonality for both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs were identified as follows:
 - Growing Populations
 - New Housing Development Sites
 - Ageing Populations
 - Health Inequalities
 - Rising demand including mental health.
- 2.2 A report was presented to the Cambridgeshire HWB on 24th April 2018 outlining the constitutional processes to establish joint working relationships between the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Boards from a Cambridgeshire County Council perspective. Further details were requested by board members on the membership of a joint committee. Agreement was given in principle for both HWBs to meet at the same time to discuss items on a shared agenda. Meetings of both HWBs were held on 31st May and 20th September 2018.

3. NATIONAL OVERVIEW

3.1 HWBs are a statutory requirement for upper tier and unitary local authorities. The Health and Social Care Act 2012 ("the 2012 Act") makes it a requirement of the both Councils to establish a HWB. The Section 195 of the 2012 Act also requires HWBs to encourage those who arrange for the provision of any health and social care services in their area to work in an integrated manner.

- 3.2 Working together more closely for the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs will assist in discharging the functions of: encouraging integrated working between commissioners and providers of health and care in the two councils, in so far as it relates to areas of common interest and for the purposes of advancing the health and wellbeing of their populations and preparing a Joint Strategic Needs Assessment. Currently both HWBs have separate HWB Strategies but there is synergy within these strategies.
- 3.3 Section 198 of the Health and Social Care Act 2012 provides that

Two or more Health and Wellbeing Boards may make arrangements for: -

- (a) any of their functions to be exercisable jointly
- (b) any of their functions to be exercisable by a joint sub-committee of the Boards
- (c) a joint sub-committee of the Boards to advise them on any matter related to the exercise of their functions.
- 3.4 The Statutory Guidance on Joint Strategic Needs Assessments and Joint Health and Wellbeing Strategies provides that "Two or more health and wellbeing boards could choose to work together to produce JSNAs and JHWSs covering their combined geographical area. Some health and wellbeing boards may find it helpful to collaborate with neighbouring areas where they share common problems as this can prove to be more cost effective than working in isolation" (Paragraph 3.1)
- 3.5 The Statutory Guidance provides the option for both HWBs to be maintained as a parent board but establish a Joint Sub-Committee to discharge agreed functions for both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs. Items pertaining specifically to Cambridgeshire or Peterborough can be considered by the parent board and those wider integrated issues could be considered through the establishment of the joint sub-committee.

4. LOCAL ARRANGEMENTS

4.1 In order for these functions to be devolved to a Joint sub-committee, Cambridgeshire County Council's constitution requires Full Council to agree changes to the Cambridgeshire Health and Wellbeing Boards terms of reference. Recommendations need to be made to the Constitution and Ethics Committee who will then decide whether to recommend the amendments to Council. Table 1 outlines the associated timescales to allow for this change in the constitution.

- 4.2 Section 3.5 explains that the Statutory Guidance allows HWBs to be maintained via a "Parent Board". Following the meeting of the Cambridgeshire HWB on 24th April a number of discussion points were raised:-
 - Concern was raised over the number of meetings increasing if a parent board was required along with joint sub-committee.
 - Issues over sub-committee membership were raised with concerns expressed that participation in parent board meetings only, would not allow for a meaningful contribution.
 - Difficulty over aligning membership across both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Boards e.g. Peterborough Board had neither voluntary sector nor provider members.
 - District Council participation was part of the Cambridgeshire HWB but as Peterborough City Council was a unitary authority the question of District Council representation did not arise there.

It was resolved at this meeting "to agree in principle to the approach of establishing a Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) joint sub-committee of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs, subject to further detail on membership being presented to and approved by the Cambridgeshire Board". Peterborough HWB has changed its terms of reference to include the following listed under its functions:

"To establish a joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough sub-committee in relation to issues that cross local authority boundaries"

4.3 There are a number of options around how joint working between the two HWBs could work as outlined in the options below:

Option 1 – Parent Board with joint sub-committee

Both Cambridgeshire & Peterborough HWBs maintain their "Parent Board" but hold meetings of the "Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Board (a subcommittee comprising of both boards)" where items that are relevant to both committees will be discussed e.g. wider system integration issues. Legally the status of these joint meetings means they are referred to as a sub-committee however they will be able to discharge agreed functions of both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs and will have delegated decision making authority. Membership would comprise of the full membership of both the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs and would address some of the concerns raised in section 4.2.

Items pertaining specifically to Cambridgeshire or Peterborough can be considered by the parent board. Cambridgeshire HWB currently meets six times a year so, for example, it could be proposed that there could be three meetings of the Parent Board with two to three meetings of the sub-committee. Peterborough HWB have less meetings over a year and would need to determine their preferred meeting pattern. Terms of reference and chairmanship of the sub-committee would need to be agreed by both Cambridgeshire and Peterborough HWBs.

Option 2 – Maintain two the separate Boards which periodically meet at the same time and with the same agenda – Meeting in public together

Maintain the independence of the two HWBs as two separate boards periodically holding a meeting at the same time and venue, with a shared agenda. This approach has been tested during the May 31st and Sept 20th meetings. The meeting would need to be jointly chaired and any recommendations or decisions recorded separately for each Board. Operationally this approach would require duplication of officer time with the production of two sets of minutes and having two chairs. Whilst this approach would allow for debate and perspectives from both HWBs it would mean that decisions from each HWB would be taken separately and could differ. If the purpose of establishing joint working relationships between the two HWBs is for better integration of services, this approach may present some risks to this.

4.4 As part of the establishment of new working arrangements outline in Option 1 Cambridgeshire County Council requires its Constitution and Ethics Committee to review the proposal and consider changes to the HWB's terms of reference.

It is recommended that if these are being reviewed in the context of establishing a "Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Board (a sub-committee comprising of both Boards)", consideration should be given to the existing membership of the Cambridgeshire HWB. Currently the voluntary sector has a co-opted membership of the HWB and this presents an opportunity to formalise this arrangement to a permanent membership.

5. ALIGNMENT WITH THE CAMBRIDGESHIRE HEALTH AND WELLBEING STRATEGY

- 5.1 This report is relevant to priorities (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 6) of the Health and Wellbeing Strategy but has a particular emphasis on priority 6: Working Together.
 - Priority1: Ensure a positive start to life for children, young people and their families.
 - Priority 2: Support older people to be independent, safe and well.
 - Priority 3: Encourage healthy lifestyles and behaviours in all actions and activities while respecting people's personal choices.
 - Priority 4: Create a safe environment and help to build strong communities, wellbeing and mental health.
 - Priority 5: Create a sustainable environment in which communities can flourish.
 - Priority 6: Work together effectively.

Introduction

The Cambridgeshire Health and Wellbeing Board (HWB) is established as a committee of the County Council under section 102 of the Local Government Act 1972. Its remit is to work to promote the health and wellbeing of Cambridgeshire's communities and its focus is on securing the best possible health outcomes for all residents.

- Five nominated District Council representatives (supported by Senior District Council officer with Observer Status)
- Three representatives of the Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) (nominated by the CCG Governing Body)
- Five representatives for NHS providers (a mix of non-executive directors and executives, one each from Cambridge University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust; Cambridgeshire and Peterborough NHS Foundation Trust; Cambridgeshire Community Services NHS Trust; Hinchingbrooke Health Care NHS Trust; Papworth Hospital NHS Foundation Trust)
- One representative of the local HealthWatch*
- Director of Public Health*
- Executive Director: People and Communities*
- Chief Finance Officer (Section 151 Officer)
- Representative of NHS Commissioning Board*
 - * Statutory members of the HWB. There is also a statutory requirement for at least one Local Authority Councillor, and at least one representative of the CCG, to be a member of the HWB.

The Health and Wellbeing Board shall establish a Joint Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health & Wellbeing Board (a sub-committee comprising of both boards) with the following membership and powers.

Membership

Membership will comprise the full membership of both the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Boards. The Chairman/woman of the Sub-Committee shall alternate annually between the Chairman/woman of the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Health and Wellbeing Boards. The Vice-Chairman/woman of the Sub-Committee shall be selected and appointed by the membership of the Sub-Committee.

Overview of Functions

The Sub-Committee has delegated authority to exercise all the Health and Wellbeing Board's functions relating jointly to Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, with the exception of functions relating to Cambridgeshire only which will remain with the Cambridgeshire Health and Wellbeing Board.

1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 At its meeting on 27th September 2018, the Committee considered guidance which had been drafted as part of the Council's consideration of actions flowing from the investigation into complaints involving the community transport organisations FACT, HACT & ESACT.
- 1.2 Due to the high profile nature of the community transport investigation and the need to ensure all members of council were aware of the guidance, the Committee was asked to consider whether the guidance should be ratified by Full Council, once agreed by the Committee, as part of Full Council's remit is to appoint representatives to outside bodies.
- 1.3 In considering the guidance, Members acknowledged that they had found themselves in situations where they were judged to have held an interest without their knowledge and that while there were brief mentions of these issues in the Localism Act and the Council's Code of Conduct, these mentions were insufficient and had left Members and officers uninformed of their obligations.
- 1.4 It was therefore proposed that before taking the guidance to Full Council a full review should be carried out, as quickly as possible, of all the outside bodies that had a relationship with the Council to establish their relevance and current status, noting that some bodies might not require a representative of the Council. After the review, the outside bodies nomination list would be redrawn and all relevant Members and officers briefed and informed of their legal status e.g. observer, director or trustee.
- 1.5 In considering the role of the SMT in the review process, it was noted that most appointments to outside bodies were made by the relevant Policy and Service Committee following a delegation by General Purposes Committee. It was suggested that each Service should assign an officer to review the outside bodies relating to their area and following consultation with the Policy and Service Committee Chairs, Vice-Chairs and Lead Members determine the necessity for a Member to be appointed to them.
- 1.6 It was also proposed that individual Members be informed of the review early in the process to avoid conflict if positions on outside bodies were removed without prior knowledge and also to ensure that they were alerted to the guidance as soon as possible. The Committee observed that the procedure with officers would be different and that SMT would need to include officers in the review as well as the Members.
- 1.7 It was proposed to categorise the involvement of Members and officers on outside bodies according to the level of the position held, as well as differentiating between appointed and nominated positions. Current position holders would be advised and given the opportunity to acknowledge any potential conflicts or step down.
- 1.8 Members acknowledged that taking the guidance to Full Council would allow all Members the opportunity to become aware of its existence while emphasising its importance to them. However, it was agreed that following the outcome of the fundamental review of appointments to all outside bodies and the way they were categorised, to sit alongside the guidance, the Committee would determine whether to issue the guidance or refer it to full Council.
- 1.9 It was noted that the guidance was unclear on who the Members and officers were responsible to with respect to the Council and LGSS. The presenting officer suggested that including a list of scenarios would help and that each situation was different, which was why the review of each individual body was so important. It was suggested that training could

be conducted following the review, which would include informing Members on their responsibilities and liabilities depending on their specific level of involvement.

2. STRATEGIC MANAGEMENT TEAM REVIEW OF OUTSIDE BODIES

- 2.1 On 10 October 2018, SMT was asked to carry out a fundamental review of appointments to all outside bodies including the way they were categorised, to sit alongside the guidance. It was asked to consider the following:
 - 1. Outside Bodies appointed to by Council
 - 2. Outside Bodies appointed to by General Purposes Committee (GPC)
 - 3. Outside Bodies appointed to by all Policy and Service Committees
- 2.2 The deadline for the completion of the review was Friday, 16 November 2018.

3. PROPOSED CHANGES TO THE CONSTITUTION

3.1 Part 3a – Allocation of Responsibility for Functions – Full Council and Committees states the following:

Council Functions

Only the Council will exercise the following functions:

- Appointing representatives to outside bodies unless the appointment has been delegated by the Council
- Making appointments to the Fire Authority
- 3.2 It is proposed that the separate list of outside bodies appointed to by Council should remain.
- 3.3 Part 3B Responsibility for Functions Committees of Council General Purposes Committee states the following:

The GPC has a number of specific functions including the following:

Appointing members to a range of external bodies

Delegated Authority	Delegation/ Condition
Authority to nominate representatives to Outside Bodies other than the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire Authority, the County Councils Network Council and the Local Government Association	

- 3.4 GPC currently refers appointments to the other partnership liaison and advisory groups to the relevant policy and service committee.
- 3.5 It is proposed that the above Delegated Authority to GPC should be amended to include the Combined Authority and Greater Cambridge Partnership, which are Council appointments.

3.6 It is also proposed that Delegated Authority should be given to each Policy and Service Committee to nominate representatives to Outside Bodies, which cover their service area. The following would therefore be added to the terms of reference for each Policy and Service Committee including GPC:

Delegated Authority	Delegation/ Condition
Authority to nominate representatives to Outside Bodies other than the Combined Authority, Greater Cambridge Partnership, Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Fire Authority, the County Councils Network Council and the Local Government Association	

- 3.7 There would therefore be, excluding Council appointments, one list of outside bodies, which would indicate the Policy and Service Committee responsible for the appointment.
- 3.8 It is proposed that a report listing each outside body separately and setting out the following should be produced for each Annual Meeting of Full Council:
 - aims and activities
 - the name of the Council's representative
 - the status of that representative on the body
 - how many meetings are held a year
 - whether expenses are paid by the organisation
 - whether there is insurance provision in place
 - a report from the Member representative on what they have done over the last year.

4. OUTSIDE BODIES – FINAL LISTS

4.1 It is proposed that there should be only two outside bodies' lists. Each list indicates the "Guidance Classification" to ensure the legal status of the body is both clear to the Council's representative and the officer supporting that representative. Outside Bodies lists for Full Council and Policy and Service Committees are attached at **Appendix A and B** respectively.

1. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. The Localism Act ("the Act") places a statutory duty on the County Council to promote and maintain high standards of conduct amongst its Members and co-opted Members. This includes the obligation on the County Council to have in place a Code of Conduct setting out the standard of conduct expected of Members when acting in their capacity as County Councillors.
- 1.2. The requirements of the Act are supported by Article 2 of the Constitution, Members of the Council, and by Part 5.1, Members' Code of Conduct. The Constitution and Ethics Committee's terms of reference give it authority to monitor the operation of the Code of Conduct and the complaints received under it.
- 1.3. This report serves to provide the Constitution and Ethics Committee with an overview of the complaints received under the Code of Conduct from 19 September 2018 when it last met to 19 November 2018.

2. OVERVIEW OF COMPLAINTS

- 2.1. Since 19 November 2018 two new complaints against Members have been received by the council's Monitoring Officer, one of which has just been made and the other has been concluded. A complaint which was made in August 2018 has also been concluded.
- 2.2 Details of the two complaints which have been concluded since 19 September 2018 are set out in Appendix 1 and 2.
- 2.3. The publication of details of complaints only takes place after conclusion of the complaint to reduce speculation on limited information, ensure there is no compromise of any assessment or investigation, and that the Data Protection Act 1998 is complied with.

INITIAL ASSESSMENT OF COMPLAINT DECISION NOTICE

Subject Member: Cllr Steve Count - Cambridgeshire County Council

1. Background

- 1.1 On 20 August 2018 Stephen Rix, Interim Monitoring Officer at Central Bedfordshire Council, who was deputising for the Monitoring Officer while she was on holiday, received a formal complaint from Cllr Nichola Harrison, ("the Complainant"), which alleged that Cllr Steve Count ("the Subject Member") had failed to act in accordance with the council's code of conduct. The Subject Member is the Leader of Cambridgeshire County Council ("CCC") and group leader of the Conservative group on the complaint concerned actions taken (or not taken) by the Subject Member in relation to the resignation of another Conservative councillor, Cllr Paul Raynes who was leaving his role as a councillor to take up a senior officer position on the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority ("CPCA"). The post was a politically restricted post which meant that he could not continue to also be an elected member.
- 1.2 The Complainant alleges that the Subject Member should have sought Cllr Raynes's resignation in a more timely manner and by not doing so "he appears to have acted for partisan reasons and without the integrity needed to guarantee the independence and reputation of the county council".

2. Evidence Considered

- 2.1 The following documents and information were considered for the purposes of this complaint:
- 2.1.1 Original complaint email dated 20 August 2018 from the Complainant to Fiona McMillan (Acting Monitoring Officer for CCC at the time) and copied to a number of member including the Monitoring Officer of CPCA, stating that "having followed the news about Cllr Raynes's appointment as a senior officer of the CPCA I am very concerned that there has so far been no announcement of his resignation as a county councillor....I simply want to know that he is off the premises as he clearly has a conflict of interest in continuing his political role. If the resignation is delayed, it will look as though he and/or the Conservative group are trying to keep him in place for their own purposes. Moreover the public will be extremely concerned if he continues to collect an allowance from CCC."
- 2.1.2 Email response from Stephen Rix to the Complainant on 20th August stating that "having been in contact with Fiona today I can confirm that both Cllr Raynes and the Council are fully aware of these issues."

- 2.1.3 Email response from the Complainant to Stephen Rix on 20th August lodging a formal complaint against both Cllr Raynes and the Subject Member and clarifying and expanding on her complaint and giving notification that she would be publishing this complaint.
- 2.1.4 Email from Kim Sawyer, the Monitoring Officer of the CPCA to the Complainant on 28th August 2018 setting out the terms of s.1 of the Local Government and Housing Act 1989 which referred to the disqualification and political restriction of certain officers and staff: "A person shall be disqualified from becoming (whether by election or otherwise) or remaining a member of a local authority if he holds a politically restricted post under that local authority or any other local authority in Great Britain." She confirmed that she was asked by Cllr Raynes for advice on interpreting this section prior to him accepting the post and that she had advised that he did not hold a politically restricted post until his contract with the CPCA commenced on 14th September and that his duty was to resign before that date. This email was copied in to the same respondents as the Complainant's initial email which included the Subject Member.
- 2.1.5 Email response from Fiona McMillan to Cllr Harrison on 4th September setting out the response received from Kim Sawyer, Monitoring Officer of the CPCA which set out that Cllr Raynes did not "hold" a politically restricted post until such time as his contract with the CPCA started on 14th September 2018 and therefore his duty was to resign from CCC at some stage before this date. She confirmed that she concurred with this advice and advised the Complainant that there was therefore no legal requirement for him to have resigned before this and that both she and the Chief Executive of CCC had been made aware of the situation and Cllr Raynes had received advice. She advised that as Cllr Raynes had resigned from CCC on 21 August with immediate effect it was not possible to proceed with a code of conduct complaint against him. She asked if in the light of this the Complainant wished to withdraw her complaint against the Subject Member.
- 2.1.6 Email response from the Complainant stating that "my concerns are not concerned with the legality of what has taken place but with what I believe to be breached of the Code of Conduct....I do wish the complaint against Cllr Count to be properly considered."
- 2.1.7 Subject Member's response; Cllr Count and Cllr Raynes were notified of the complaint by Stephen Rix on 21st August 2018.
- 2.1.8 Email from Cllr Raynes to Stephen Rix dated 21 August stating that he had already resigned that day and that "I only posted my acceptance of the new job yesterday afternoon so my new employer may not even have received it yet. I don't think I could have been expected to resign before actually reading the contract, agreeing the terms and conditions and formally accepting the job. News of my appointment got out through a leak, not an announcement."

- 2.1.9 Email from the Subject Member to the Complainant dated 28 August following the receipt of the email from Kim Sawyer stating: "The advice received appears to clearly vindicate me. You called for me to resign publically so I wish to ask what public action you now plan to take to rectify your unfair portrayal of me and my standards."
- 2.1.10 Email from the Complainant to the Subject Member on 30th August stating: "Kim Sawyer's email on behalf of the Combined Authority is not relevant to my complaint. The complaint is addressed to the county council's monitoring officer and concerns what I believe to be a breach of the county council's Code of Conduct."
- 2.1.11 Email from the Subject Member to the complaint dated 30th August 2018 stating: "Considering the factual nature of the Combined Authority's response I cannot believe you have not withdrawn your complaint to avoid wasting the County Council's scant resources. If you cannot yet see that you have misjudged this I suggest you discuss this with your leader, as to whether she considers you are wasting the county's resources or not."
- 2.1.12 Members Code of Conduct

3. Jurisdiction

- 3.1 For a complaint to be considered in connection with the Member's Code of Conduct, the following test must be satisfied:
 - a) the complaint was made against a person who, at the time the alleged action took place, was a member of Cambridgeshire County Council; and
 - b) the Subject Member had signed up to the Members' Code of Conduct in force at the time the alleged action took place; and
 - c) the Subject Member was conducting the business of their authority or acting, claiming to act or giving the impression of acting as a representative of the authority.
- 3.2 It is considered that all three limbs of this test are satisfied in this matter.

4. Initial Assessment Decision

- 4.1 The Independent Person and Monitoring Officer have considered whether the actions of the Subject Member summarised in paragraphs 1.1 and 1.2 above could constitute a breach of the following provisions of the Members' Code of Conduct.
- 4.2 In assessing whether there is a breach or potential breach, and in view of this whether further action is warranted, the complaint must be considered from an objective view point bearing in mind the provisions of the Members' Code of Conduct. The Complainant does not state which sections of the Code may have been breached.

- 4.3 Having considered the allegations, the relevant sections of the Code are therefore believed to be:
 - The preamble to the Code relating to the Nolan Principles which states "Councillors....should act in an open and transparent manner and should not do anything which would prejudice the reputation of the Council."
 - Section 2.2 of the Code which states: "You must not conduct yourself in a manner which could reasonably be regarded as bringing your office or authority into disrepute."
- 4.4. The Independent Person and Monitoring Officer considered the following:
- a) Whether the Subject Member breached the Code of Conduct by failing to ensure Cllr Raynes's "timely resignation" and in doing so acted in a partisan way and without the integrity needed to guarantee the independence and reputation of the county council." The Subject Member's involvement with Cllr Raynes's resignation is unclear and not evidenced by the Complainant. However it was assumed that as group leader he was made aware by Cllr Raynes of the offer from the CPCA and what actions he planned to take.
- b) Whether the advice received by the Complainant from the Monitoring Officer of the CPCA and the Acting Monitoring Officer of CCC in relation to the legality of Cllr Raynes's actions was indicative that the Code of Conduct had not been breached as if Cllr Raynes acted entirely within the law then how could the Subject Member have acted inappropriately or the reputation of the council be prejudiced? Is the fact that the news of the appointment was leaked before Cllr Raynes had the opportunity to formally accept the offer and then resign the responsibility of the Subject Member?
- c) One of the factors to be taken into account as part of the initial assessment of complaints is whether the complaint is "politically motivated." The Complainant is a Liberal Democrat councillor and the Subject Member is the Leader of the Conservative group. The Subject member published her complaints online as soon as they were lodged.
- 4.5 In summary, the Independent Person's view is that:
- a) Whilst the Subject Member was no doubt made aware of Cllr Raynes's offer from the CPCA the complainant has provided no evidence that the Subject Member failed to ensure Cllr Raynes's "timely resignation".
- b) The legal advice received by the Complainant from both the Monitoring Officers (the CPCA and CCC) in relation to the legality of the situation "are indicative that the code of conduct has not been breached. The information that I have been provided with tells me that Cllr Raynes's contract with CPCA started on 14th September 2018 and that his duty to resign was at some stage before that date. In fact Cllr Raynes resigned on 21st August, the day after he

posted his acceptance of the post. This seems to me to be entirely reasonable and timely. It cannot be the responsibility of the Subject Member that news of Cllr Rayne's appointment was leaked before he had the opportunity to formally accept the offer."

- c) It was not possible to form a view on whether this complaint was politically motivated from the evidence.
- 4.6 The Independent Person advised that in her opinion there was no apparent breach of the code and therefore no further action should be taken.
- 4.7 The Monitoring Officer concurs and therefore no further action will be taken.

INITIAL ASSESSMENT OF COMPLAINT DECISION NOTICE

Subject Member: Cllr Ian Manning - Cambridgeshire County Council

1. Background

1.1 On 9 October 2018 the Monitoring Officer received a formal complaint from a complainant who wished their identity to be kept confidential ("the Complainant"), alleging that Cllr Manning ("the Subject Member") had breached the Cambridgeshire County Council Code of Conduct. The Complainant states he noted a conversation the Subject Member started on Facebook, asking for protesters for an event in Cambridge City and that further into the conversation a debate started regarding the event, in which, the Subject Member requested a person to "...just fuck off on this one pretty please" ('the Posting'). The Complainant submits it was disrespectful and not appropriate and that it came across as shutting down debate in an unreasonable way.

2. Evidence Considered

- 2.1 The following documents and information were considered for the purposes of this complaint:-
- 2.1.1 Complaint sent by email on 9 October 2018 together with two attachments showing the Facebook postings;
- 2.1.2 Response from the Subject Member sent by email on 12 October 2018 together with four attachments showing further Facebook postings and screenshots of the Subject Member's Facebook profiles for his Councillor account and personal account;
- 2.1.3 The Council's Members Code of Conduct.

3. Jurisdiction

- 3.1 For a complaint to be considered in connection with the Member's Code of Conduct, the following test must be satisfied:
 - the complaint was made against a person who, at the time the alleged action took place, was a member of Cambridgeshire County Council; and
 - b) the Subject Member had signed up to the Members' Code of Conduct in force at the time the alleged action took place; and
 - c) the Subject Member was conducting the business of their authority or acting, claiming to act or giving the impression of acting as a representative of the authority.
- 3.2 The Monitoring Officer and Independent Person have concluded that this test is not satisfied in this matter (see below).

4. Initial Assessment Decision

- 4.1 The Monitoring Officer and Independent Person considered whether the Subject Member was conducting the business of his authority or acting, claiming to act or giving the impression of acting as a representative of the authority.
- 4.2 The Subject Member provided evidence of two Facebook accounts/profiles: a councillor profile and a personal profile and the Posting in question was made from his personal profile. Further, the Subject Member stated it was made from his personal Facebook account.
- 4.3 The Independent Person considered that the Posting was 'ill advised', however it did not seem that the Subject Member could be said to be conducting the business of the authority (or claiming to act or giving the impression of acting as a representative of the authority) at the time of the alleged complaint.
- 4.4 It is therefore the view of the Independent Person that there is no jurisdiction to deal with the complaint under the Members' Code of Conduct and the Monitoring Officer agrees with this view. There can therefore be no further action on the complaint.
