1.	What is the existing service, document or action being impact assessed? What are the aims and objectives of the service, document or action?	This impact assessment considers the impact of the Authority continuing to manage the Oasis Day Nursery in Wisbech. The future of the Nursery has been under review since September 2011, with a decision sought by Cabinet on 17 April 2012. The objectives of the review are to: • To ensure that early years and childcare provision within the Waterlees ward meets the needs of the families (with 0-5 year olds) who live there. • To ensure that best value is achieved in the delivery of childcare, and Children's Centre services, and • Ultimately, to improve outcomes for children living in the Waterlees ward. The current aim of the Oasis Nursery is as follows: "The Oasis Nursery aims to ensure a safe, fun learning environment, which reflects the interests of children and their families. Our setting will work with children, parents and the community to ensure the safety of children and to give them the very best start in life".
	What is the proposed change? What will be different?	 If the Authority continues to govern, manage and run the Nursery it will seek to bring in the following key changes: A reduction in the capacity of the nursery from 50 full-time places to 32-38 full-time places to bring this more in line with current and forecast need for places. A refocusing of the provision onto the free early years places, especially for the most vulnerable two year olds ("Free twos"), meaning a facility registered only for children aged 2 and above, i.e. it would no longer be registered to take babies. An increase in the space dedicated to use by the Oasis Children's Centre enabling it to increase the activities and services it is able to provide for children aged 0-5 and their families. Closer working with the Oasis Community Centre and the Children's Centre. In addition, there could be change to the governance structure of the provision at Authority and local level.

The review has involved full consultation with all stakeholder groups, which are listed in the attached stakeholder analysis.

As there are currently no children under 1 year of age registered at the Nursery at the current time, no children and families would be affected by an amendment in the registration levels of the Nursery as detailed in section 1.

Users of the nursery (children and families): As of 1 February, there were 62 part-time registered children using the facility. The numbers were spread

 What evidence has been used to inform this view?

All other age groups would continue to be accommodated, so there would be minimum impact on these children and their families.

What plans are in place to mitigate any negative impacts identified?

Staff at the nursery: There are currently 4 staff employed by the nursery, including the Manager. This equates to 4 FTE. The Manager is on a fixed term contract. All nursery nurse staff would still be needed and their contracts would not be changed. Should Cabinet decide that the Nursery should continue to be run by the Local Authority, arrangements will need to be made to appoint a Nursery Manager on a permanent contract.

Local Authority staff: The Oasis Day Nursery is the only one of 316 early years and childcare schemes in the County which is run and managed directly by the Authority. All of the other schemes are run by Private. Voluntary or Independent (PVI) providers. Management of the Nursery has placed significant additional demands on Local Authority staff, specifically the Locality Manager. Should the decision be taken that the Authority should continue to run the Nursery this would need to appropriately recognised through the appointment of a permanent member of staff to take on day-today oversight of the Nursery and provide pastoral support to the Nursery Manager and staff.

Children's Centre staff: Changes to Nursery management staff will mean that rebuilding strong links with Children's Centre will be needed.

Oasis Centre Trust and staff: As above. Otherwise, no impact.

Orchard Primary School (the neighbouring school) staff and governors: As above. Otherwise, no impact.

All parents locally with children in the 0-5 age range: Parents with babies will have to seek alternative provision. However, there are vacancies among local Childminders and the three day nurseries within 1 mile radius of the Oasis. There are, therefore, sufficient and suitable alternative providers for parents who need childcare for children aged 0-2 in order to enable them to work.

Private, voluntary, or independent (PVI) providers of childcare: These providers would not have the opportunity to tender to run and manage the Nursery.

4. Making a judgement:

- Your final judgement – will your service, document or action have a positive, negative or neutral equality impact?

From the impacts described above it is the judgement of the review group that the equality impact of this option would be neutral overall. However, it would limit the Authority's ability to enhance and develop the services available to 0-5 year olds and their families provided through the Oasis Children's Centre.

The potential equality issues that have been identified for consideration as part of the changes proposed are as follows:

Age: Currently 3 children of young parents (under 21) use the Oasis Nursery. They would be able to keep their children at the Oasis, or receive support at any time to find an alternative provider. As younger parents may be more likely to be looking to return to school/training after having a baby, support may need to be given in time to secure a position at an alternative childcare provider for a young parent with a child under 2 that could no longer be accommodated at the Oasis.

Disability: Throughout the review process, consideration has been given to individuals with a disability: holding open consultation events in accessible venues, using and accepting consultation feedback through a range of media, for example telephone, email, letters. This approach would continue in publicising any changes to the services offered. There is also expertise within the Children's Centre and the Childcare Information Service (CIS) brokerage scheme that offers particular support for parents to meet the childcare needs of their disabled children.

Ethnicity, race and culture: currently 12 children from ethnic minority backgrounds use the Oasis Nursery, plus 2 from a known Traveller background. Ensuring that these groups fully understand the review, and any ensuing changes to services will continue to be a priority.

Deprivation: 69% of the users of the Oasis live within the Waterlees ward, the most deprived within the County, so any ongoing additional support needs that are identified as outcomes of this review need to be addressed by the Nursery and Children's Centre in partnership with other support organisations such as the Citizen's Advice Bureau (CAB) and the Childcare Information Service (CIS) (for financial or affordability issues).

Establishing the body described above would put the nursery on an equal footing with the Oasis Community Development Trust (trustees are all local residents) and the Children's Centre, which has a Parents Forum, so it could improve relations still further with these key groups.

Being an authority run facility the engagement of children and young people in the locality would continue to be at the centre of our operations.
