1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Chequers public house is located at the junction of High Street and Denmark Road, Cottenham (**Appendix 1**).
- 1.2 There is an area of highway between The Chequers and the war memorial which is used for informal car parking and can accommodate four cars.
- 1.3 The landlord submitted an application for three picnic benches to be placed on public highway along the south west frontage (**Appendix 2**).
- 1.4 There are six existing benches in the beer garden at the rear of the premise, which is privately owned.

2. PAVEMENT LICENCE PROCESS

- 2.1 The Pavement Licence procedure is a statutory consultation process that requires the Highway Authority to advertise, on-street, a public notice stating the proposal. The notice invites the public to comment on the proposals in writing within a twenty eight day notice period.
- 2.2 The Pavement Licence was advertised on-street on 8th July 2014. The statutory consultation period ran from 8th July 5th August 2014.
- 2.3 The statutory consultation resulted in 5 responses comprising of 2 objections and 3 in support.
- 2.4 A local County Member, Councillor David Jenkins, a district councillor and the parish council support the proposal. The responses received and officer comments are detailed in **Appendix 3**.
- 2.5 On the basis of this analysis, it is recommended that a pavement licence is issued for three benches.

Localism and Local Member Involvement


The local members were consulted and Councillor Jenkins supports the proposal. Councillor Mason has been emailed for a view – to date no response.

Public Health Implications


The South Cambridgeshire District Council Environmental Health team have been consulted and have no concerns.

1.	The picnic benches will allow customers to sit at the front of the pub and cause a disturbance to residents late at night.	The applicant has asked for the finish time for the licence to be 22:00 and has confirmed that he will monitor the use of the benches and will not allow them to be used after this time.
	The picnic benches will result in the loss of a car parking space for drivers including those using the shop and takeaway.	Although there are double yellow lines in the High Street to the north east of the junction with Denmark Road, there is unrestricted parking in High Street to the south of the junction with Denmark Road, in Denmark Road and in Lyles Road.
2.	There are already issues with smoke and noise from the benches in the beer garden.	These benches are on private land. If there are similar issues with the benches within the Pavement Licence area we are able to amend the conditions or refuse renewal of the licence after the first year.
