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1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 Together with the neighbouring village of Fenton, Pidley forms the civil parish of Pidley cum Fenton. Pidley is a small village in Cambridgeshire, within the civil parish. Pidley is located approximately 7 miles north-east of Huntingdon and, approximately 14 miles north-west of Cambridge (Appendix 1).
- 1.2 Oldhurst Road is a residential road on the south-east of Pidley, providing one of the main entrances to the village (Appendix 2). On the other extreme of the village High Street is the main entrance to Pidley from the south-east side of the village (Appendix 3).
- 1.3 To provide a smoother transition between the national speed limit and the 30mph entering the village on both ends the parish council have applied to the installation of two sets of speed humps on Oldhurst Road and one set on High Street (Appendix 4).
- 1.4 Funding for the proposed was secured through a successful Local Highways Improvement (LHI) bid by the Parish Council.
- 1.5 Pidley cum Fenton Parish Council have applied for the installation of speed humps for road safety reasons to reduce the chance of vehicle collisions, to make exiting and entering Pidley village and other properties/businesses along this stretch of Oldhurst Road and High Street safer.

2. MAIN ISSUES

- 2.1 The Notice of Intention (NOI) is a statutory consultation process that requires that the Highway Authority to advertise, in the local press and on-street, a public notice stating the proposal and the reasons for it. The advert invites the public to formally support or object to the proposals in writing within a twenty one day notice period.
- 2.2 The NOI was advertised in the Hunts Post on the 17th June 2020 and the statutory consultation period ran from the 17th June 2020 to the 12th July 2020.
- 2.3 The statutory consultation resulted in 5 representations. All the representations are included in the table in Appendix 5, however, in the interest of data protection all representations have been summarised/redacted to omit identifiable information. The officer responses to each representation are also given in the table.
