19. Apologies for Absence and Declarations of Interest

Apologies were received from Alex Pearson, Paul Stratford, Rob Turner and Councillor Bryony Goodliffe.

Apologies for lateness were received from Councillor Claire Daunton.

No declarations of interest were received.

Following their departure and imminent departure, Patsy Peres and Liz Bassett were thanked for their contributions to the Board.

20. Schools Forum Minutes – 14 January 2022 and Action Log

The minutes of the meeting held on 14 January 2022 were approved as a correct record.

The Forum noted the action log.

21. Review of Proportionality and Membership of Schools Forum

The Schools Forum was asked to review proportionality on the forum in relation to the latest data from the January 2022 census; which assessed whether any further changes were required to seating allocation on the forum; and to review the current vacancies and appointments identified for reelection. Following an evaluation of proportionality, it had been concluded that no changes were required. However, some appointments were eligible for review including one maintained school governor and three academy appointments, as well as one caused by the retirement of Liz Bassett. An election process for this would occur in September 2022.

It was resolved to:

Note and comment on the report.

22. Schools and Dedicated Schools Grant Financial Health

The Schools Forum received a report which set out the financial information for maintained schools, dedicated schools and academies (as published by the Department for Education [DfE] at 31 March 2022). Overall, dedicated school funding had a cumulative deficit of £39m, while the maintained school summary position remained consistent with a balance of £15.7m. Within that, some individual school balances had changed significantly – with a greater number now in excess of £150k, seven schools now in excess of £400k, while thirteen were in deficit. The balance clawback mechanism had previously been relaxed to an excess of 16% or £80k for maintained primary or special schools and 10% for maintained secondary schools. The officer also noted that the Schools Financial Value Standards had been submitted to the Education Funding Agency, with the exception of three schools, one of which was exempt and two that were yet to submit.

Internal audit had visited fourteen maintained schools and key findings were circulated to schools.

The Service Director for Education warned that coronavirus alleviation and upcoming cost pressures affected balances found in the report.

Individual members raised the following points:

- A governor-informed reporting mechanism may capture school positions more accurately than the survey currently used.
- ISB figures may be more usefully presented as a percentage, rather than figures.
- There was concern for lowering the excess threshold significantly considering the rise in energy costs, increasing cost of living, and staff inflation pay awards. The officer responded that threshold changes would be reviewed alongside the changing national context. Balance control mechanisms would also ensure resource was moved to areas in need without negatively affecting schools with excess.
- Clarified that, despite the appearance of an overall consistent balance, funding was still required from Government due to the differing finances of individual schools and changes in pupil numbers. This would be mapped out to Government with the county's history of proficient spending. Data submission of high needs block pressures had been useful for mapping the county's position against the rest of the country.
- Agreed to review modelling projections for maintained schools over the next three years including energy costs, pay reward, income and multiyear cost pressures. This could inform the Government of future cost concerns. Action.

It was resolved to:

Note and comment on the report.

23.a) Dedicated Schools Grant (Safety Valve) and Financial Management

The Schools Forum received a report on the financial context for and consequences of the high needs block deficit and the way forward in the context of the DfE safety valve programme. The high needs block deficit was

in excess £39m and the service expected that spending would continue to exceed income. This deficit was housed in a negative reserve not seen elsewhere in the Council budget and the legality of which would expire in March 2023 without Government extension. The Department for Education had pressed councils to focus on delivering high needs blocks initiatives and the in-year balance for the Dedicated Schools Grant. The situation in Cambridgeshire was similar nationwide and elsewhere multi-year plans were being modelled with Safety Valve deals. The Council would also develop a multi-year plan, but would require national funding support.

Members noted that the increase in Education, Health and Care Plans [EHCP] was national, although modelling showed that over the past seven years Cambridgeshire's trajectory was stronger. The safety valve process aimed to meet this demand through early intervention. An additional Schools Forum would be arranged to discuss this. **Action**.

It was resolved to:

Note and comment on the contents of the report.

23.b) High Needs Block and Safety Valve Update – July 2022

A slide pack for the report which was shared with the Schools Forum and the Schools Forum Working Group could be found on the Council website, <u>here</u>. The officer highlighted that, nationally, three quarters of local authorities had a high needs block deficit. Cambridgeshire's response to this was similar to other successful local authorities, although high demand for educational psychologists able to perform statutory assessments remained a problem. The service's safety valve proposals aimed at early intervention and prevention using fourteen workstreams, such as multiagency panels, in which the Schools Forum were encouraged to be involved.

Individual members raised the following points with regard to the slides:

- Clarified that implementation of the SEND transformation would need to occur prior the Green Paper becoming legislation. Once implemented, it would provide positive foundations for service work through a banding system, EHCP template and case management system.
- Noted that placement provision was challenged by geography. In addition to Enhanced Resource Base places, the Council had invested £60m into the creation of 750-800 places for enhanced provision which would accommodate the 210 children currently requiring specialist placements. These additional placements, including the potential development of a free school, would reduce costs on the service from out of county placements and private tuition.
- Confirmed that the SEND for Change Group comprised of individuals with previous experience and backgrounds working in finance and as Head

Teachers. They had met weekly for eight weeks and a paper would be brought to the Schools Forum in autumn detailing the group's work.

The presentation continued to state that, in order for the Department for Education to meet the high needs deficit in Cambridgeshire, the Council would be required to submit an outline proposal for budget balancing to the DfE. This proposal would include a short-term deficit increase, followed by a long-term decrease; modelling for mitigating any negative impact on children will be reviewed in autumn. Significant changes resulting from the budget review had been identified for consideration, including a multi-year block transfer.

Individual members raised the following points with regard to the slides:

- Clarified that a multi-year block transfer above 0.5% would need to be agreed by the Secretary of State. If this was approved and following consultation with the Schools Forum, a 1% increase was possible.
- Agreed that the reduction in EHCP applications listed in the Green Paper had caused parental concerns. If implemented, the service would focus on offering provision and support for parents, especially in early years.

25. Schools Funding Formula Update – July 2022

The Schools Forum received a report for which there was a slide pack, as can be found on the Council website, <u>here.</u> It included details on: block transfer impacts; the planned review of the Indicative SEND budget; consideration of growth funding by the Department for Education (in Cambridgeshire current funding did not meet basic need); premises funding; changes to distance eligibility; the minimum funding guarantee; a transition timeline; and current and proposed legislation.

It was resolved to:

27. Any Other Business

The Director for Education clarified that local authorities had discretion on the application methods for supplementary funding. Following consultation with providers, it was agreed there would be £125 per commissioned place for special schools and there would be further consideration on the funding for Alternative Provision APs and unsettled.

An additional meeting was proposed for 30 September 2022 to discuss the high needs block and safety valve funding.

The scheme for the high needs contingency budget would be reviewed in November, but currently included: a 0.5% transfer for schools with an exceptionally high proportion of children requiring EHCPs relative to the notional SEND budget (this was calculated by comparing 80% of the school's notional SEND figure (it was estimated the other 20% would be spent on children without EHCPs)); representation of schools housing children from out-of-area; and consultation with schools with high balances regarding the reallocation of budget prior to allocations.

Information has been published on the Department for Education (DfE) website and includes:

- <u>Indicative Figures</u> for each school compared to their 2022-23 baseline formula allocations
- These are not the final budget figures but a generational model to derive LA level funding
- Indicative DSG Allocations for 2023-24 based on October 2021 census (figures will be updated for the October 2022 census in December's final allocations)



Schools Block

- DfE published illustrative figures show a £8.8m / 2.0% increase for Cambridgeshire (excluding changes in growth funding) compared to the amount due to be received in 2022/23.
- The Schools Supplementary grant has been baselined into the National Funding Formula (NFF) allocations. (*Risk this could be reduced to reflect reduction in NI contributions?*)
- NFF formula factors have been uplifted by varying percentage.
- Local authorities must use all NFF factors, and can only use NFF factors. No impact for CCC as we already comply with this approach.

Schools Block

- Local authorities required to move local formula factor values at least 10% closer to the NFF, including the area cost adjustment.
- Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) can be set between +0% and reduced maximum of +0.5%
- No national cap but LAs can still opt to use a local cap to manage overall affordability
- 0.5% limit on movements between funding blocks remains.



High Needs Block

- The 23/24 high needs NFF includes a 5% funding floor to make sure that all local authorities receive an increase of at least 5% per head of their 2-18 population, compared to their 2022 to 2023 funding baseline
- Current illustrative figures for Cambridgeshire show approx. increase of £4.6m / 4.9% compare to current allocations. Will be updated on receipt of final figures.
- Minimum Funding Guarantee for Special Schools to be calculated over 2 years – 21/22 to 23/24.

Slide #6

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Central Schools Services Block (CSSB)

- The CSSB provides funding for the benefit of all schools for ongoing and historic commitments.
- Historic commitments reduced by a further 20% from last year resulting in a net CSSB reduction of £0.4m compared to 22/23:
 - Ongoing responsibilities:
 - Admissions
 - Copyright
 - Statutory/Regulatory Duties etc
 - Historic Commitments:
 - Contribution to Combined Budgets



Early Years Block

- Consultation undertaken in the summer of 23/24.
- Proposed changes mainly in respect of using updated datasets and baselining grants.
- Resulting potential illustrative uplifts of £0.29 per hour for 2 year olds and £0.21 per hour for 3/4 year olds. Final allocations still to be confirmed.
- As per previous announcements maintained nursery school supplement confirmed until March 2025.

Illustrative Budget Modelling

- Appendix 2 contains illustrative school level budget allocations for 23/24:
 - Figures are based on 22/23 datasets and pupil numbers, and as such will change on receipt of final October 23 census data.
 - Modelling has assumed the 1% block transfer as per Safety Valve proposals (0.5% increase compared to 2022/23)
 - Minimum Funding Guarantee (MFG) has been set at the maximum +0.5% per pupil.
 - Final figures will also be updated to reflect changes for growth funding, new schools and business rates.

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Illustrative Budget Modelling



- The formula factor unit values applied have been weighted based on overall affordability, and exceed the minimum allowable values set by the ESFA (further details on the following slide).
- Currently the Minimum per Pupil Levels (£4,405 for Primary and £5,715 for Secondary) have been met.
- Should overall affordability be an issue on receipt of final datasets we maybe required to apply for a disapplication to reduce the MPPL, or could consider reducing the MFG below the 0.5% maximum.

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Consultation



- The schools funding formula continues to be an LA decision in 2023-24.
- As in prior years, schools must be consulted on:
 - a) Any changes to the formula being proposed; and
 - b) Any transfer proposed from the Schools Block.
- For 23/24 there are no major changes being proposed to the local funding formula, other than the required alignment with the NFF.

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Consultation



- As previously discussed a 1% block transfer has been built into Safety Valve assumptions and applied to budget modelling.
- We will still be asking Schools Forum to give views / vote on the block transfer, but as above the 0.5% threshold will require a disapplication request and ultimately be a decision by the Secretary of State.

Consultation



- Virtual briefing sessions will be held for key stakeholders in November – Dates to be confirmed.
- Comments on the budget proposals should be emailed to <u>schools.funding@cambridgeshire.gov.uk</u> by 5pm Friday 2nd December. Responses will then be considered at the Schools Forum meeting on 14th December.

Required Actions



Funding Formula

a) Schools Forum are asked to comment on the proposed LA approach for the Cambridgeshire Schools Funding Formula for 23/24.

Any feedback received during the consultation period will be presented at the December meeting for further discussion. On receipt of the final datasets in December additional modelling will be undertaken and shared at the January meeting, prior to final approval at CYP Committee.

High Needs Block Transfer

b) Following previous discussions in respect of the Safety Valve Intervention Programmed Schools Forum are asked to approve a block transfer between the Schools Block and High Needs Block of 1% - (circa £4.4m – actual amount to be confirmed on receipt of final DSG allocations and subject to SoS approval).

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Notional SEN Budget



- Local authorities are required to identify a notional budget for mainstream schools, to help with their duty to meet the special educational needs (SEN) of their pupils.
- The notional SEN is <u>not</u> a separate formula factor or funding allocation, so does not generate funding in its own right, but is based on a % of factors which contribute towards a school's overall funding. Currently the same % is applied across primary and secondary...
 - 4.62% of Basic Per Pupil Entitlement
 - 7.67% of FSM and FSM6 Funding
 - 68.32% of IDACI Deprivation Funding
 - 33.74% of Prior Attainment Funding

Notional SEN Budget



- Previously proposed a contingency scheme which would compare schools notional SEN to the number of £6k contributions per EHCP.
- By setting a percentage threshold additional funding would be allocated to those schools where the notional SEN supports less than x% of the £6k contributions.
- Schools Forum SEND sub-group requested that EHCPs from other LA's be included in the calculation and following the collection of this data the figures have been updated to reflect these pupils.

Notional SEN Budget



- Appendix 3a shows potential High Needs contingency allocations for 22/23 based on 2 options:
 - Option 1 Comparison of Notional SEN to number of EHCPs as per the previous slide. A revised threshold of 92% has been applied due to overall affordability.
 - Option 2 For those schools >5% of EHCP on role and allocation of funding based on £6,000 multiplied by the number of EHCPs in excess of 5%.
- Whilst recognising the limitations of both approaches Option 2 removes the direct link to the notional SEN budget and provides support to those schools with a higher proportion of EHCPs.
- In both options consideration would need to be given to the level of balances held by the school.

Notional SEN Budget



- Appendix 3b provides comparative data as to how other local authorities calculate the levels of notional SEN (based on 2022/23 budget submissions).
- As a percentage of the total Schools Funding Formula the Cambridgeshire figure (7.11%) is low when compared to the average of regional and statistical neighbours (10.82%).
- As part of the NFF consultation the DfE have stated their intention to move towards a standard national approach.
- It is therefore proposed to increase the notional SEN % to be more in line with statistical / geographical neighbours as a first step towards this national change.



Required Actions



- Notional SEN / High Needs Contingency
 - c) Schools Forum are asked to comment on the options for allocating the available £450k high needs contingency fund.
 - d) Schools Forum are asked to comment on the proposal to increase the % of delegated budget identified as notional SEN to align with regional and statistical neighbours.



Central Schools Services Block



- Illustrative CSSB allocation of £5.5m compared to £5.9m in 22/23. Includes further 20% reduction in funding for historic commitments and increased allocation for retained duties.
- Copyright License costs (excluding VAT) are expected to increase. Additional cost will be met from the CSSB rather than being a direct cost to schools.
- Broadband subsidy has ended.
- Local Authority Business Planning proposals include £1m of funding to reduce the Contribution to Combined budgets. Remainder to be removed in 24/25.
- Any residual balance on CSSB to support DSG deficit recovery.

Growth Funding



- Currently reviewing the Growth Fund process with the intention of moving towards a more formulaic approach for 2023/24.
- Growth would be based on forecast numbers and/or planned expansions to meet basic need only.
- Funding would still be allocated as a lump sum per additional class for qualifying schools, but would avoid the need for an application other than in exceptional cases.
- Not currently proposing a change to the overall centrally retained Growth Fund, which currently stands at £1.67m.
- The total cost of implicit growth will not be known until final pupil data is received from the ESFA in December.
- Final local proposals, including a revised policy will be presented at the December or January meeting for approval.



Growth Funding



- No new primary or secondary schools due to open in September 2023.
- Variations to pupil numbers continue to be applied to new and growing schools whilst they fill to capacity.
- As part of the DfE consultation "Implementing the direct national funding formula" undertaken earlier in the year there were proposals in respect of how funding for growth and new schools could be allocated as part of the direct NFF.
- Until this new approach is confirmed the LA are unable to provide any long-term commitments to funding arrangements as they will be subject to the outcomes of the national policy change.

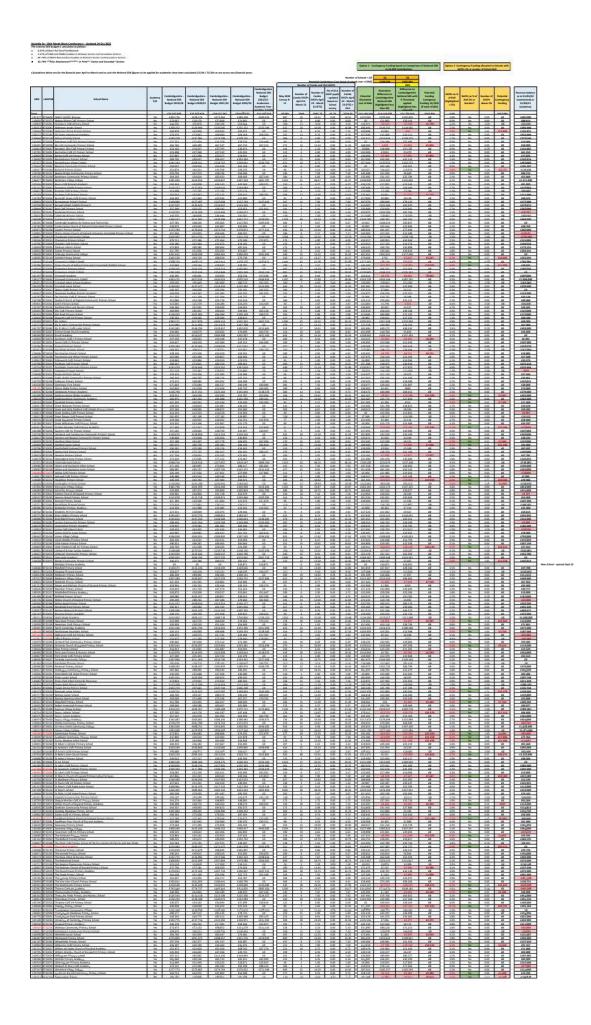
