# Section 11: Adult Social Care Adult Services Contributions, Charges and Schedule of Payment Rates

## **Contributions and Charges**

#### Residential and Nursing Care

Residential and Nursing Care contributions are financially assessed in line with the Department of Health's Charging for Residential Accommodation Guide (CRAG) in support of The National Assistance (Assessment of Resources) Regulations 1992.

Service Users with capital above the upper capital limit (currently £23,250 may increase in 2012) contribute the full cost of their placement.

A 3<sup>rd</sup> party may agree to provide additional funding to enable the service user the option of an alternative placement.

# Fairer Contributions Policy Self Directed Support (subject to consultation in 2012)

Fairer Contributions guidance, which is based on the principles of Fairer Charging, requires that each service user is given a financial assessment to determine how much they can afford to contribute towards the cost of their social care support. Advice on welfare benefits entitlement is also provided along with support to claim relevant benefits.

Service users who have capital above the limit set by the Department of Health (currently £23,250) but may be increased in April 2012) will pay a contribution that reflects the full cost of the service. This may also apply to service users who have significant levels of income.

Service users who do not wish to disclose their financial position will pay a contribution that reflects the full cost of the service.

Other service users will pay a contribution based on the assessment of their ability to contribute towards the cost of their care, with the overriding principle that these service users will have a Protected Amount (basic Income Support/Pension Guarantee level, plus 25%) before a contribution for care is made.

For service users who receive a disability benefit, the assessment process takes account of disability-related costs (subject to review and consultation in 2012). A standard figure will be used to assess disability related costs (£26 per week). However, service users are entitled to a full assessment of their disability-related costs if they feel these are more than the standard amount.

# **Example of calculated contribution:**

Total weekly 'assessable income'	£258.00
Less weekly housing costs	£19.23

The weekly amount is then converted to an annual contribution to the personal budget – in this case  $\pounds$ 2,142.03 ( $\pounds$ 41.08 divided by 7 multiplied by 365 days)

Using the example above your notification would show the following:

If you were allocated an annual personal budget of  $\pounds$ 5,200 to support your needs, you would be asked to contribute over the year  $\pounds$ 2,142.03 and the Local Authority would contribute the balance of  $\pounds$ 3,057.97.

#### Respite

For those people in receipt of a Personal Budget, periods of planned respite will be included within their support plan with a financial contribution made to the agreed Personal Budget amount.

Where a period of unplanned (emergency) respite is provided a separate contribution of £100 per week (or pro rata if less than a week) will be payable.

#### **Reablement and Intermediate Care**

Service users will be exempt from contributions for up to six weeks of reablement and intermediate care services.

#### **Exemptions Waivers and Reductions**

No financial contribution towards a Personal Budget will be made if the person is receiving support from the Independent Living Fund; in these cases, contributions will instead need to be paid to the ILF.

There are also no charges to:

- Service Users who receive aftercare under S117 of the Mental Health Act
- Service Users with Creutzfeldt-Jakob Disease (CJD)

Cambridgeshire County Council can consider waiving or reducing charges in exceptional circumstances, for example undue financial hardship or carer breakdown.

# Disabled Facilities Grants Top-Ups (subject to consultation in 2012)

Disabled Facilities Grants ('DFGs') are mandatory, meanstested grants administered by District Councils under The Housing Grants Construction & Regeneration Act 1996. Authorities with Social Services responsibilities have a duty, under legislation, to help people who cannot afford to pay the contributions required by their assessment towards the cost of housing adaptations.

The Local Authority makes a charge for providing financial help in these circumstances – charges are calculated in accordance with Fairer Contributions regulations

Each service user is given a financial assessment to determine how much they can afford to contribute towards their adaptation, and is provided with advice on welfare benefits entitlements.

The financial assessment will disregard the first  $\pounds$ 6,000 of household capital in line with the Department for Work and Pensions benefit rules. Any capital in excess of  $\pounds$ 6,000 will be deemed to be available for the outstanding top-up funding.

#### For example:

Top-up amount requested	£10,000
Service user's capital	£8,000
Net difference	£2,000

 $\pounds$ 2,000 is therefore deemed to be available to contribute to the top-up amount. Therefore the outstanding top-up amount is reduced to  $\pounds$ 8,000.

Service users who do not wish to disclose their financial position will pay a contribution that reflects the full cost of the DFG Top-up amount.

Other service users will pay a contribution based on the assessment of their ability to contribute towards the DFG Topup, with the overriding principle that these service users will have a Protected Amount (basic Income Support/Pension Guarantee level, plus 25%) before a contribution is made.

 Pricing Policy for Independent Sector Spot Purchased Residential and Nursing Care Placements in Cambridgeshire

The pricing policy is the <u>maximum</u> that the Council will normally pay for Residential / Nursing placements spot purchased from the independent sector in Cambridgeshire.

The Council values its partnership with the independent sector. In reviewing the pricing policy the following factors have been taken into consideration:

- The need to fund at an appropriate level to ensure an adequate supply of high quality provision
- The difficulty accessing placements in some parts of the county and the fragility of some sectors of the market
- The need to achieve efficiencies across all social care provision, both in-house and purchased from the independent sector

#### Older People

Currently, for this client group (older people 65+) there are different rate bands based on the geographical location of the <u>provider</u>.

#### **Other Client Groups**

It is proposed to retain the existing countywide rates for other client groups (i.e. mental health, learning disability, physical disability under pension age).
