Outcome: Children are ready for and attend school, and make expected progress

Eligibility Priorities

- A child who is has a persistentabsence rate of 10% across the last 3 consecutive terms
- A child who has received at least 3 fixed term exclusions or 10 secondary / 5 primary excluded days in the last 3 consecutive terms
- A child who has been permanently excluded from school in the last 3 consecutive terms
- A child who is in alternative provision for behavioural problems
- A child who is neither registered with a school, nor being educated in a n alternative setting
- A child referred by education professionals as having schools attendance problems of equivalent concern to the indicators above because he/she is not receiving a suitable full time education

Indicators

- Children have an average attendance rate of 90% across 3 consecutive school terms
- Children have fewer than 3 fixed term exclusions and no permanent exclusions across 3 consecutive terms
- Children have made achieved (or have been assessed as being on track to achieve) the appropriate level of attainment at the end of the appropriate Key Stage
- Take up of 2 year old entitlement for eligible families sustained for at least 1 term
- Take up of universal entitlement for 3 and 4 year olds sustained for at least 1 term
- Elective home Education plans are assessed as meeting the educational needs of the child
- Children have a suitable Individual Alternative Education Plan in place which is being reviewed no less frequently than half termly

Outcome: Adults and young people have the skills, qualifications and opportunities to succeed in the employment market and make a positive contribution

Eligibility Priorities

- An adult in receipt of out of work benefits (ESA, IB, CA, IS, JSA, SDA) or an adult who is claiming Universal Credit and is subject to work related conditions
- A young person who is identified as Medium or High risk of being NEET in Year 10 or is leaving school with few / no qualifications
- A child living in a household identified as living in poverty
- A young person who is not in education, training or employment
- Parents and families referred by professionals as being at significant risk of financial exclusion e.g. debt issues / rent arrears, risk of homelessness

Indicators

- An adult or young person has secured one or more of the following:
 - Voluntary work and has regularly attended for 13 weeks
 - o Undertook significant work experience over the last 13 weeks
 - o Achieved or is significantly working towards a recognised vocational qualification
 - Parents / Carers have successfully completed an adult learning course
 - o Is regularly attending an apprenticeship continuously for 26 or 13 weeks
 - Is working part-time (less than 16hrs) continuously for 26 or 13 weeks
- An adult or young person demonstrates or shows progress towards demonstrating the following capabilities in respect of EET;
 - o Self-awareness / Drive / Receptive / Self-assured / Resilient / Informed
- Engagement in positive peer relationships through regular structured activities
- Families are working towards reducing the risk of financial exclusion over a sixth month period by;
 - Debt / rent arrear reduction plan in place and being adhered to and a subsequent reduction in debt
 - Eviction process suspended / on hold
 - o Take up of Free School Meals and appropriate benefits

Outcome: Families enjoy good physical and mental health and have a healthy lifestyle

Eligibility Priorities

- A child or an adult with parenting responsibilities with mental health needs
- A child or adult with parenting responsibilities with physical health needs
- A child eligible for an Education Health and Care Plan
- An adult with parenting responsibilities or a child with a drug or alcohol problem
- A child with a concerning level of A&E admissions
- A new mother who has a mental health or substance misuse problem and other health factors associated with poor parenting or emotional impact. This could include mothers who are receiving a Universal Partnership Plus service
- Adults with parenting responsibilities or children who are referred by health professionals as having any mental and physical health problems of equivalent concern to the indicators above. This may include unhealthy behaviours, resulting in problems like obesity, malnutrition or diabetic

Indicators

- Reduced risk / concern for children over a 6 month period
- All household members registered with a GP
- All children are registered with a dentist and have had a check up within the last six months
- One member of the household has stopped smoking for at least 3 months
- Reduced number of A&E admissions for children
- Plans and strategies are in place and regularly reviewed on an annual basis
- Within a six month period, family member referred and attached to relevant health service and / or family member is self-managed and has an improving level of functionality
- Successful completion of substance misuse treatment with no re-lapses for 6th months
- Reduction in weight to a healthy level of one household member who has been assessed as overweight or obese
- All children in the household have received age appropriate vaccinations

Outcome: Families are protected from harm and neglect and are provided with support with their problems before they become too difficult to manage, increasing their resilience

Eligibility Priorities

- A young person or adult known to local services as having experienced, currently experiencing or at risk of experiencing domestic violence or abuse
- A young person or adult who is known to local services as having perpetrated and / or prosecuted for an incident of domestic violence or abuse in the last 12 months
- The household or a family member has been subject to a police call out for at least one domestic incident in the last 12 months
- The CAF process for a family has been started
- A child who has been identified / assessed as needing early help because they;
 - are below the threshold for services under s17 Children Act 1989
 - o are experiencing or at risk of poor parenting
 - have developmental delay
 - present with challenging behaviours
 - were previously accommodated and are returning home from care
- A child 'in need' under section 17, Children Act 1989 or a child who has been subject to an enquiry under section 47, Children Act 1989
- A child subject to a Child Protection Plan
- A child or young person at risk of / or affected by sexual exploitation

Indicators

- CAADA-DASH risk score reduced at exit as assessed by case worker
- Engaging in domestic violence programme
- Victim or perpetrator engaging with support and has an understanding of their experience
- Attending accredited parenting course and implementing new strategies over a 6 month period
- Family CAF being implemented and successfully completed and no rereferral to services within 6 months
- Improved scores against all areas of Family Assessment (e.g. Distance Travelled Tool / Outcome Star / or equivalent)
- Child in Need Plan or Child Protection Plan completed successfully and no re-referral to Social Care within a 12 month period
- No re-engagement with public services within 6 months of receiving a low intensity interventions, 12 months if received a high intensity intervention
- All members of the family have increase resilience scores on their Family Assessment

Outcome: Families contribute to the community and are not engaging in anti-social or offending behaviour

Eligibility Priorities

- A child who has committed a proven offence in previous 12 months
- Ahousehold where a family member has an anti-social behaviour intervention (or equivalent local measure) in the last 12 months
- A family or household where there has been 3 or more police callouts in a rolling 30 day period
- An adult prisoner who is less than 12 months from his/her release date and will have parenting responsibilities on release
- An adult who is currently subject to license or supervision in the community, following release from prison, and has parenting responsibilities
- An adult current serving a community order or suspended sentence, who has parenting responsibilities
- Adults or children referred by professionals because their potential crime problem or offending behaviour is of equivalent concern to the indicators above
- A family at risk of homelessness

Indicators

- To have fully engaged with parenting programmes in prison
- To remain out of prison from the start of the order for a period of 6 months and no proven offences recorded in this period
- At least a 60% reduction in offending in the last 6 months
- At least a 60% reduction in ASB across the household over the last 6 months
- At least a 60% reduction in police callouts
- No deliberate fire incidents recorded
- No court action has been commenced and current tenancy is secure
