#### 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 The Lancaster Way Business Park has an obligation under a Section 106 agreement to make capacity improvements to the roundabout at the junction of the A10 and A142 to the south west of Ely. The roundabout is often referred to as the BP roundabout, being immediately adjacent to a BP Filling Station. This is required to mitigate the specific transport impacts of the development in line with the National Planning Policy Framework requirement. It is a vital development to support economic growth within East Cambridgeshire and is expected to generate just over 3,000 jobs, 75% of which are expected to be filled from the local area.
- 1.2 Ordinarily, these works would have been delivered by the developer of the business park, Grovemere Property under a Section 278 agreement. However, the County Council agreed to assist in establishing a highway solution to unlock the challenges associated with existing congestion in the local area and enable this economically important development to move forward.

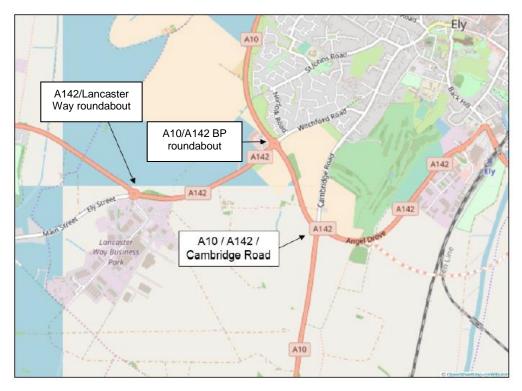


Figure 1; Scope of feasibility study incorporating all three junctions.

- 1.3 This led to the completion of a feasibility study of potential improvements to the immediate highway network, encompassing the A10/A142 BP roundabout, A142/Lancaster Way roundabout and the A10/A142 Cambridge Rd roundabout, as shown in figure 1 below. This was funded by the developer and the inclusion of the section up to the A10/A142 Cambridge Rd roundabout was funded by the County Council. The additional work was funded by the County Council's scheme development fund to understand the potential benefit of dualling the section of carriageway between the BP roundabout and Angel Drove roundabout. The traffic modelling also considered all known future development in the wider area based on a 2030 model year and the impact on these junctions.

- 1.4 The outcome of the study established that the main cause of capacity issues was the A10/A142 BP roundabout, however the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout outside the Lancaster Way development itself also impacted on the performance of the A10/A142 BP roundabout and led to further congestion.
- 1.5 The study work, which was completed in October 2018, was also broadened to establish options for a 'do minimum' as well as a more major strategic capacity improvement based on the impact of wider development. This work has also fed into the strategic transport study commissioned by the Cambridgeshire and Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) on the A10 transport corridor between Ely and Cambridge. The A10/A142 BP roundabout is the northern extent of the study.
- 1.6 Delivery of any major strategic improvements to this junction and potential improvements to the A10 itself were therefore best dealt with as part of this CPCA priority scheme. The provision of cycling and walking improvements across the A10 at and in proximity to the A10/A142 BP roundabout are also linked to this project, given the significant investment in the infrastructure required to achieve this improvement, such as a foot and cycle bridge. There are also potential changes to the layout of the highway network that may result from the strategic A10 scheme.
- 1.7 This is however a longer term strategic major project and therefore an interim scheme is required to allow the development of the Lancaster Way Business Park to proceed. The feasibility study identified that the 'do minimum' option provided a highway solution that mitigates the impact of the development on the A10/A142 BP roundabout, but also highlighted the need for improvements to the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout outside the Lancaster Way Business Park itself. There are however no requirements in the S106 for the developer to fund and deliver improvements to this roundabout.
- 1.8 A Project Board was set up for all parties involved to oversee and give direction to the development of the project. Membership of the Board includes representatives from Grovemere Property the developers of the Business Park, the Divisional County Councillor, East Cambridgeshire District Council, the CPCA, Skanska the design and build contractor and is led by County Council officers.
- 1.9 There was unanimous support from all parties involved in the project, particularly East Cambridgeshire District Council and the CPCA, for further development of the designs to take place for both roundabouts in parallel, despite the lack of identified funding to deliver the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout. This was on the basis that both organisations would consider funding the additional work to the roundabout once more certainty of the budget required was established.
- 1.10 The County Council subsequently agreed through its Economy and Environment Committee to contribute £60k for the development of the design for improvements to the unfunded A142/Lancaster Way roundabout, to provide better cost certainty of the budget required for its delivery. This was provided by the County Council's scheme development budget, funded from prudential borrowing on the basis it is repaid once the full scheme funding has been secured.
- 1.11 The developer remained responsible for funding the development and delivery of the A10/A142 BP roundabout in accordance with the S106 agreement and in October 2016, had secured from the then Greater Cambridge and Greater Peterborough Local Enterprise

Partnership (GCGP) a £1,445,000 growth fund grant. This included, among other items, provision to fund the S106 obligation at the A142/A10 BP roundabout, although at that stage no specific project had been identified.

# 2 Design Development Stage

- 2.1 The development of the design for both roundabouts commenced in March 2019 and the scheme worked through challenges with identifying the below ground utility equipment that would be impacted by the construction of the proposed design. Initial investigations highlighted challenges with electric and telecoms equipment, but also the existence of a high pressure gas main. The outline estimates received from the utility companies of the likely costs associated with diverting this equipment led to the need for a much more significant budget to construct the schemes, particularly the A10/A142 BP roundabout.
- 2.2 These utility company estimates are often higher at the earlier stages of design and as the more detailed design stage commenced in November 2019, it led to a reduction in the estimated budget required for these diversions, particularly with regard to the high pressure gas main. The potential impact was finally understood from the gas utility company in March 2020, which removed the risk of a potentially very significant cost implication that may have rendered the scheme undeliverable.
- 2.3 At that stage the scheme remained on programme for construction to commence in July 2020, however it was becoming clear in January 2020 that the total budget required to deliver the A10/A142 BP roundabout was much higher than had been budgeted for by the developer of the business park.
- 2.4 The CPCA therefore indicated that it may consider contributing funding to the A10/A142 BP roundabout in addition to the unfunded A142/Lancaster Way roundabout. This was on the basis that the viability of the Business Park development would become challenging and be at risk of not continuing without further investment support.
- 2.5 On 23<sup>rd</sup> April 2020 an initial draft target price estimate for construction was received for both roundabouts from the County Council's Term Services Contractor, Skanska. This was ahead of programme and provided some cost certainty over the budget required to deliver both roundabouts.
- 2.6 The outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic in late March had, however, by that time impacted on construction site activities and Skanska was asked to reconsider the estimates based on the nationally recognised site operating procedures for social distancing and their likely effect of reducing productivity and additional site operative welfare provision.
- 2.7 Whilst Covid-19 is the greatest risk to the project, a costed risk register has been produced to inform the general risk contingency budget. These are identified risks that are not the responsibility of the construction contractor and the key risks are listed below;
  - Unforeseen adverse ground conditions
  - Contaminated ground increasing disposal costs
  - Unchartered or unexpected location of underground utility equipment
  - Delays to the diversionary work required by utility companies impacting on construction activity
  - Significant adverse weather conditions

- 2.8 A final construction contract price for the A10/A142 BP roundabout and estimate of the budget required including for the Covid-19 risk, for the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout was received as planned on 18<sup>th</sup> May and has informed the budgets that have now been set for both roundabouts. The draft proposed designs for both roundabouts can be found in appendix A of this report.
- 2.9 The breakdown of the required budgets for both schemes is shown below;

# **3 Funding Approval**

- 3.1 The CPCA has now agreed to fund the necessary shortfall in funding for the A10/A142 BP roundabout scheme on behalf of the developer and provide funding for the additional A142/Lancaster Way roundabout scheme, following the recent confirmation of budgets required for each scheme. This totals £1.39 million and was agreed at a meeting of the CPCA Transport and Infrastructure Committee on 15<sup>th</sup> May 2020.
- 3.2 East Cambridgeshire District Council will consider approval of its proposed allocation of £150k in Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) funding to the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout, at its Finance and Assets Committee on 18<sup>th</sup> June 2020.
- 3.3 The CPCA has also proposed a specific additional risk allowance of £500k for the current and future impact that Covid-19 may have on the project. At this stage the current impact has been estimated at £420k, should the current social distancing restrictions remain in place for the duration of both schemes. This risk contingency is specifically for Covid-19 impacts only.

- 3.4 The S106 agreement with Grovemere Property will also now be amended to reflect that the Business Park development will be required to provide only a contribution to the budget required to deliver the A10/A142 BP roundabout of £988,355. The remainder of the budget will be provided directly by the CPCA through a grant funding agreement with the County Council.
- 3.5 A breakdown of the approved funding allocations are shown below for the two schemes;

3.6 The County Council has now signed a grant funding agreement (GFA) with the CPCA for the additional funding. This formalises the provision of funding and covers the full construction cost, project risk and contingencies cost and the Covid-19 risk.

# 4 A142/Lancaster Way Consultation

- 4.1 The proposals for this roundabout are not directly linked to the S106 agreement and are additional proposals funded by the CPCA and East Cambridgeshire District Council. They aim to maximise the benefit of the improvements to the A10/A142 BP roundabout by further improving capacity and minimising congestion.
- 4.2 A consultation on the proposed measures for the roundabout is therefore proposed to allow local stakeholders and residents the opportunity to comment on the final layout of the roundabout. This will also provide the opportunity for the design to be explained and the basis for options that have been considered and discounted, including the consideration of cycling and walking facilities at the roundabout.
- 4.3 This consultation will take place from late July and run for an extended period of 8 weeks, given the summer holidays. Consideration is currently underway into how this consultation can be conducted virtually without face to face events, due to the social distancing restrictions associated with Covid-19, whilst ensuring equal opportunity for all to be able to engage in the process.
- 4.4 The outcome of the consultation will be presented to this Committee in November to agree the final proposed design for the roundabout and approve construction to commence in early January 2021 for completion by April 2021.

# 5 Forward Programme

- 5.1 The A10/A142 BP roundabout is currently mobilising and subject to approval of this Committee will commence construction from July 2020 with completion estimated by the end of November 2020.
- 5.2 Following consultation on the A142/Lancaster Way roundabout and approval of this Committee in November 2020, the contractor will mobilise for construction to commence in early January 2021 with completion estimated by the end of April 2021.

#### 6. ALIGNMENT WITH CORPORATE PRIORITIES

#### 6.1 A good quality of life for everyone

There are no significant implications for this priority.

# 6.2 Thriving places for people to live

The following bullet points set out details on implications identified by officers;

- The two schemes support the need in East Cambridgeshire to support the growth of the enterprise park and see its ongoing expansion through to the next phase.
- This allows for the benefits identified within the local plan to be realised.
- The proposed improvements will enable the delivery of the enterprise zone at Lancaster Way business park second phase extension:
  - (a) generating between 2,518 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) jobs and 3,194 FTE jobs during the operational phase, once the full extent of the development is built out.
  - (b) Of the 2,518 to 3,194 FTE jobs 1,888 and 2,395 FTE jobs would be created within East Cambridgeshire.

# 6.3 The best start for Cambridgeshire's children

There are no significant implications for this priority.

#### 6.4 Net zero carbon emissions for Cambridgeshire by 2050

There are no significant implications for this priority.

#### 7. SIGNIFICANT IMPLICATIONS

# 7.1 Resource Implications

The project is entirely funded by the CPCA, East Cambridgeshire District Council and Grovemere Property. A S106 agreement and grant funding agreement are in place to formalise these funding arrangements.

# 7.2 Procurement/Contractual/Council Contract Procedure Rules Implications

The design and construction of the project has been procured and will be delivered in accordance with the County Council's Terms Services Contract with Skanska.

# 7.3 Statutory, Legal and Risk Implications

A grant funding agreement has been signed with the CPCA. The S106 agreement with Grovemere Property is also being finalised and will be amended to reflect the revised contribution to the A10/A142 BP roundabout.

The impact of Covid-19 on the project remains the greatest risk to its delivery, given the uncertain nature of the pandemic and unknown impact on the project in the longer term.

# 7.4 Equality and Diversity Implications

An EQIA will be completed on the A142/Lancaster Way scheme prior and any implications reported to Committee in November 2020.

# 7.5 Engagement and Communications Implications

Local information on the proposals and arrangements for the construction of the A10/A142 roundabout will be provided to local directly affected residents and businesses in proximity of the roundabout 2 week prior to construction commencing.

Further consultation on the A142/Lancaster Way proposals will take place from July as outlined in section 4 of this report.

#### 7.6 Localism and Local Member Involvement

The local divisional County Councillor, Cllr Anna Bailey, has been a member of the Project Board and directly involved in overseeing development of the project. The adjacent divisional County Councillor, Cllr Lorna Dupre, has also been kept informed of progress with the project and plans for consultation, alongside Witchford Parish Council.

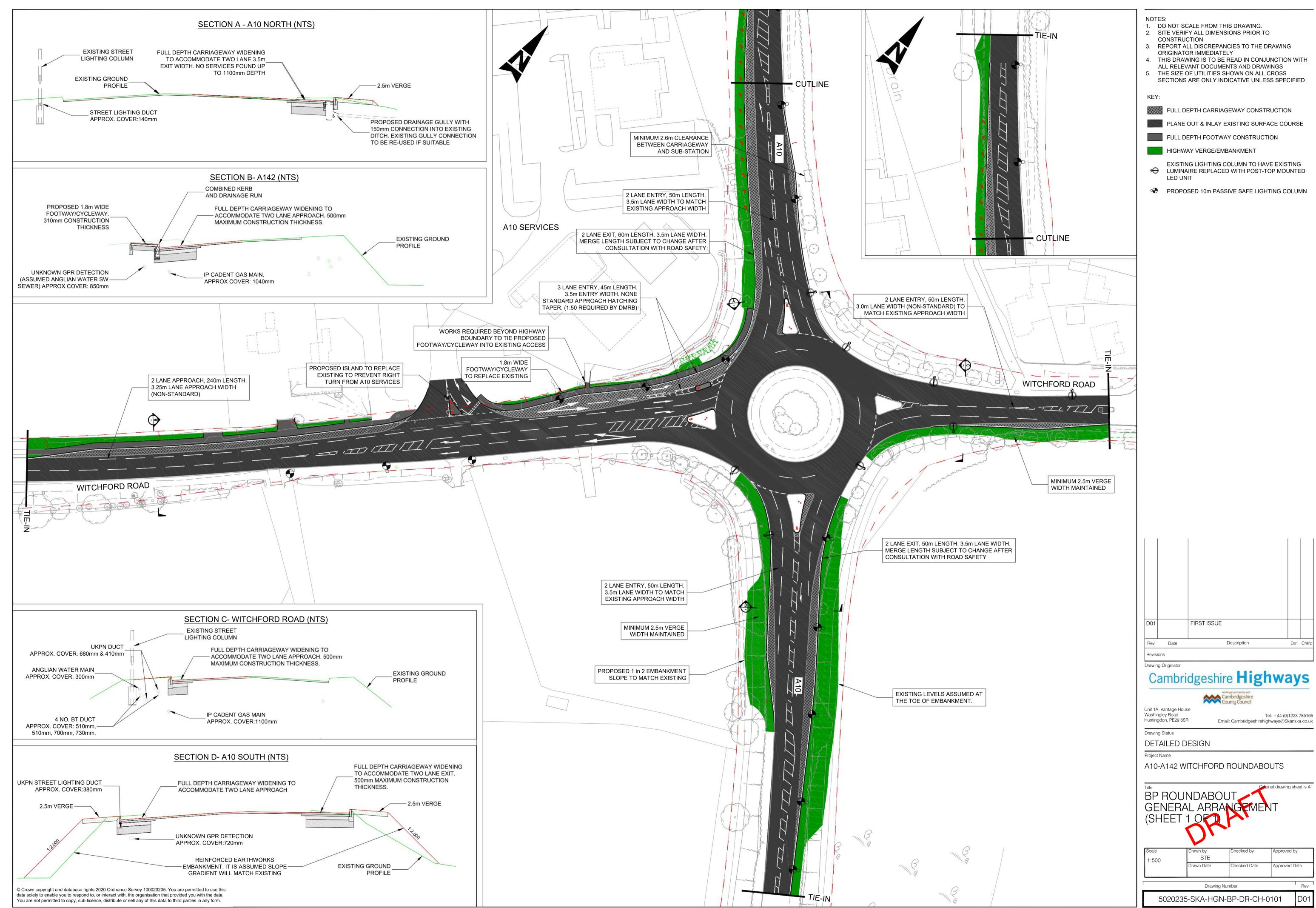

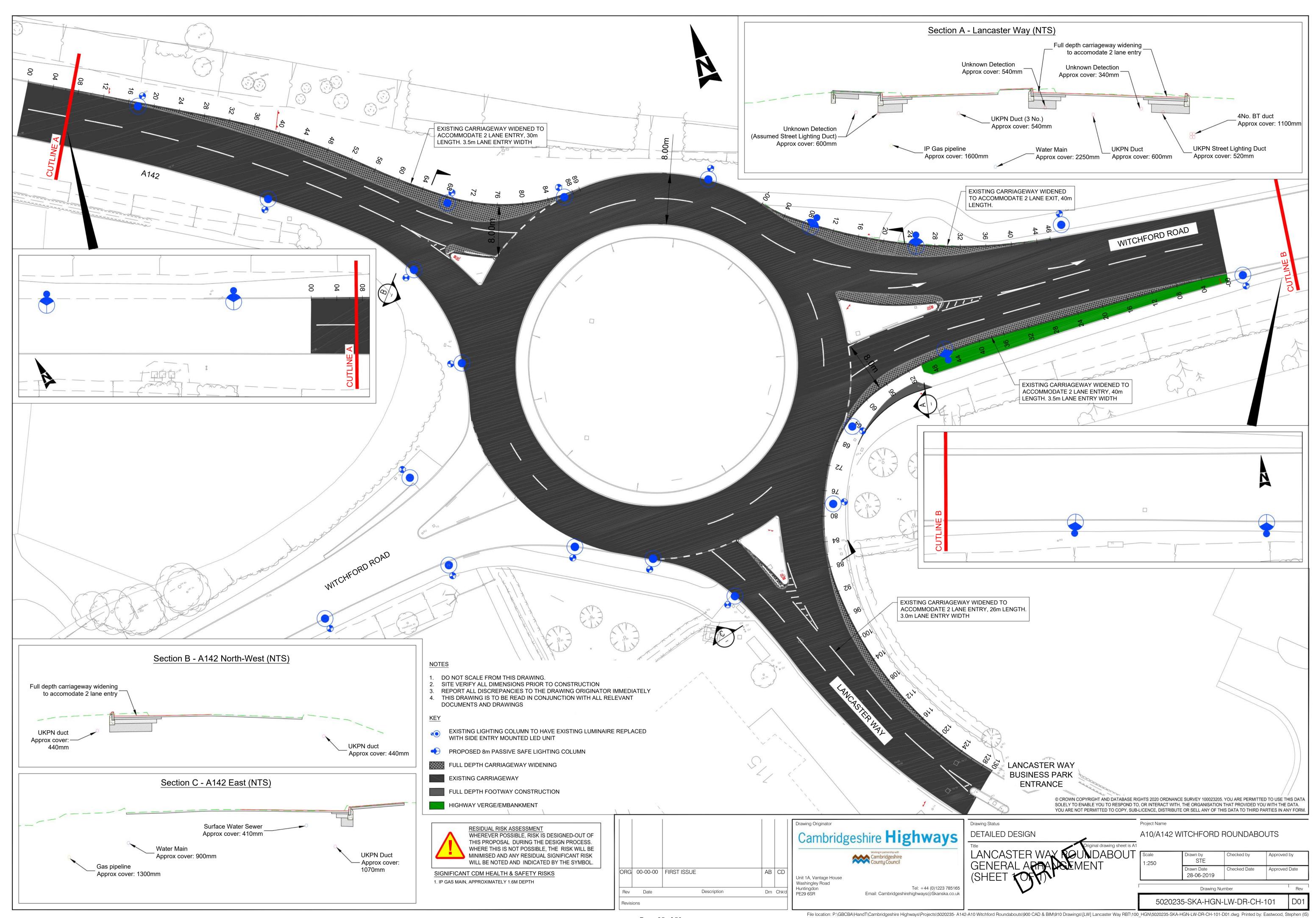

#### 1. BACKGROUND

- 1.1 In 2016, the Economy & Environment Committee approved the development of options for a foot and cycle bridge in St. Neots and business case development, funded by an allocation of £1.2m in S106 Developer Contributions.
- 1.2 Initial work included the completion of a Feasibility Study undertaken by Skanska in May 2017, which estimated that a bridge in the proposed location could cost in the region of £3.5 £4m to construct. This excluded development costs, such as design, management and planning processes and did not include risk and optimism contingency.
- 1.3 An appraisal of the likely future demand for the bridge at the chosen location was completed in July 2017, which fed into an outline business case that identified the bridge could deliver benefits of £5.6m.
- 1.4 In October 2017 the Cambridgeshire & Peterborough Combined Authority (CPCA) shortlisted the project as a priority transport scheme, committing £3.1 million in funding, subject to further development and the final business case. This was made up of £2.5m for the main bridge project together with £600k for a separate project to upgrade footpaths on Regatta Meadow / Riverside.
- 1.5 In June 2018 the project was also approved for inclusion within the St. Neots Masterplan and the business case was further developed in conjunction with the CPCA.
- 1.6 The additional £2.5m from the CPCA enabled the total secured funding for the bridge to rise from £1.2m to £3.7m.
- 1.7 A public consultation on the various options for the design of the bridge was conducted during the summer of 2018, which informed an options appraisal of the various bridge designs. The outcome led to a suspension bridge being the preferred design option.
- 1.8 In November 2018, the Economy & Environment Committee approved the further development of the suspension bridge option and progression to the developed design phase and submission of a planning application.
- 1.9 At this stage, however, it was highlighted that the total required budget to deliver the bridge was estimated to be in the region of £5.5 £6.5m and subject to securing further funding estimated to be complete by the summer of 2021. This indicated a potential shortfall in funding of up to £2.8m, but further certainty could only be gained by proceeding with the next stage of development and involvement of a civil engineering contractor. Further opportunities to secure additional funding for the project were still being actively pursued. This included discussions with Huntingdonshire District Council, St Neots Town Council and Highways England through the legacy fund associated with the A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet project.
- 1.10 In March 2019, following a procurement process through the Eastern Shires Purchasing Organisation (ESPO) Pro 5 Consultancy Framework, WSP was appointed as the consultant to deliver the planning application and detailed design.
- 1.11 This work proceeded to programme and reached the pre-application stage, which identified the need for an Environment Impact Assessment (EIA). This process included extensive

- consultation with key stakeholders including Historic England, the Environment Agency and Historic Environment teams at Huntingdonshire District Council and the County Council.
- 1.12 The EIA requirement is a substantial additional task to the development stage of a project and was not originally expected to be required, based on initial discussions between the consultant and planning department. The scoping report for the EIA has now been completed, but this extended the estimated programme for completion of the scheme to winter 2021.
- 1.13 In a bid to secure greater cost certainty over the budget required to deliver the project, a contractor was engaged through the SCAPE Civil Engineering Framework in November 2019. The framework offers an Official Journal of the European Union (OJEU) compliant procurement route and immediate access to construction expertise, vital for project teams in delivering value, greater cost certainty and understanding of construction risks and buildability challenges. This is a single service provider framework awarded to Balfour Beatty, who initially undertook a detailed review of the project in order to complete a construction feasibility report, a service provided at no cost to potential clients.
- 1.14 This looked at various aspects of the construction of the project, from buildability issues to market testing the cost to construct the scheme with supply chain partners. The report was made available in February 2020 and set out the detailed brief and scope of the works, a construction budget for the project and an initial programme through to completion. It also identified risks and an associated financial contingency allowance within the construction budget and proposed the introduction of performance measures for the project.

#### 2 MAIN ISSUES

- 2.1 The work completed by Balfour Beatty highlighted some significant civil engineering challenges. These were associated with the construction of the bridge support on the eastern side of the river. Further detailed design development work by WSP had already identified that ground conditions required a piled anchorage system. The implication of this was also magnified by the fact it is required to be constructed within a very restricted working space, located at the end of the turning head between the Priory Centre and a private walled garden. This not only added additional previously unquantified cost to the scheme, but also the need for a further risk allowance, given its challenging nature.
- 2.2 This has led to a £1.5m increase in the budget required to construct the bridge and when taking into account the necessary risk allowances, means that the total estimated budget required now exceeds the original higher £6.5m estimate, totalling £8m.
- 2.3 Opportunities were investigated by the project team to reduce the forecast cost through value engineering, but it was determined that this had limited scope to generate the value of savings now required. The value engineering exercise looked at reducing costs associated with the choice of materials and the type and method of construction for the bridge.
- 2.4 The further development of the project and forecast increase in budget required to deliver the bridge has also had a significant impact on the business case. It is now particularly challenging from a value for money perspective, given the updated benefit to cost ratio has dropped below 1.0, with valued benefits of £5.6m significantly less than the £8m estimated cost to deliver.

- 2.5 Given these changes, the CPCA decided at a meeting of its Board on 25<sup>th</sup> March 2020 to withdraw the £3.1m funding allocated and remove the project from its Business Plan. This was on the basis that the project no longer met the requirements of value for money set out in the CPCA Assurance Framework, as well as the issue set out in paragraph 2.5 above.
- 2.6 Development costs for the project to date total £962k, with all costs funded by S106 Developer Contributions. A breakdown is shown below;

- 2.7 Based on the above challenges all work has ceased, pending a decision by this Committee. The detailed design and development work can be archived and is available for further development, should an improved business case for an investment in a bridge at this location come forward in future.
- 2.8 To date £1.09m of the £1.2m S106 developer funding has been spent, £128k is therefore currently available for reallocation. It is recommended that the remainder of the S106 developer funding be reallocated to transport projects in St Neots, subject to approval by this Committee once identified.

#### 3. ALIGNMENT WITH CORPORATE PRIORITIES

#### 3.1 A good quality of life for everyone

More people cycling and walking contributes to a healthier population, improved productivity, reduced traffic congestion, reliability of journey times and adds capacity into an already constrained road network, all of which contributes to economic wellbeing.

# 3.2 Thriving places for people to live

The bridge project, if deliverable, is aligned with the St Neots Masterplan, part of a wider initiative to bring greater economic prosperity to the town.

# 3.3 The best start for Cambridgeshire's children

Currently many people including children feel unsafe cycling. Cycling is potentially a form of economic, reliable transport that allows them to access schools or training and hence independence, and the opportunity to incorporate active travel into their lives.

# 3.4 Net zero carbon emissions for Cambridgeshire by 2050

Better cycling and pedestrian links would contribute to reduced vehicle journeys. This would in turn contribute to a reduction in carbon emissions.

# 4.7 Public Health Implications

More people cycling and walking undoubtedly contributes to improved public health. It is important that people are supported and encouraged to be physically active, and any efforts should focus upon interventions that mitigate any barriers like perceived safety risks.

The Transport and Health Joint Strategic Needs Assessment makes reference to encouraging short trips of less than 2km to be undertaken on foot or by cycle. The proposals supported and encouraged this. The bridge development was planned to be used as a broader catalyst to promote walking and cycling in St Neots with a particular focus on daily journeys to and from work and school.
